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# A Remarkable Organization, a Remarkable Milestone

2006 marks the 40th anniversary of SPARC BC—and another great year

THIS IS MY final report as President, as I step down from this position at our Board meeting tomorrow. This is a remarkable organization, celebrating a remarkable anniversary.

SPARC BC continued to produce important results in our three key areas of strategic priority set by the Board: income security, community development, and accessibility. In income security, it has been a part of our history to produce reports that compare the cost of living and income assistance levels. Last year's updated report could only be called *Left Behind*; it brought renewed attention to the significant inadequacy of income assistance.

In the area of accessibility, we appreciate the support from Vancity and from Direct Access Gaming Funds to continue our work with networking among accessibility-oriented committees, organizations, individuals, and municipal representatives throughout the province. The accessibility contact directory was updated and distributed, and regional meetings were held in the Okanagan and Lower Mainland.

The Community Development Education Program delievered another ten workshops in rural and northern communities. Each workshop was tailored to the community needs and issues. Evaluations were very positive. The program will expand again this coming year.

The Research and Consulting Services program managed significant personnel changes over the course of the year, but also undertook and completed a wider range of projects than ever before.

Some examples of contracted work in the past year are:

 Cross-Canada Civic Initiative on Building Inclusive Communities

- Plan for the Social Well-Being of Surrey Residents
- Defining the Role of the City of Kelowna in Social/Community Planning
- CMHC research projects on Homelessness and People Who Use Substances and those with Concurrent Disorders

The Parking Permit Program hit another milestone this past year, now administering over 90,000 permits for designated parking for people with disabilities. Services were expanded and customer service training was a priority. The Finance and Administration team kept SPARC BC professionally managed and functioning smoothly.

SPARC BC News continues to be a pleasure to receive and read. The themes of the last year attracted a wide range of authors and proved a valuable way of communicating with our members and the community at large about important social issues.

We changed our name last year, but our mission, our definition of a just and healthy society, and our values remain resolute. On behalf of the Board of Directors, we thank the staff of SPARC BC for their dedication and hard work. We are proud to be a part of such a dynamic and professional organization. I also want to extend my special thanks to my colleagues on the Board of Directors for their vision, diligence, and prudence. I have enjoyed working with you all.

TREASURER'S REPORT

# SPARC BC Reports a Increased Revenues and Continued Financial Strength

Strong funding, donations, and social enterprise revenues mark 2005/06

AS A TREASURER of SPARC BC, I am very pleased to report that 2005/06 was another strong and successful fiscal year, with a total recorded surplus of \$80,165.

SPARC BC expenditures increased 6% over 2004/05. Most of this increase is due to increased payroll costs from new staff, including an additional Researcher for Community Development hired in August. The organization also undertook a number of large events and projects, including a dialogue event on accessibility in collaboration with Simon Fraser University in April, the first provincial Community Social Planning Network Conference in June, public education around elections at every level of government, and the continued expansion and development of the Community Development Education Program, among others. As is typical in service-oriented non-profit organizations, the SPARC BC staff is our primary asset and vital to achieving our goals.

Supporting the core mission activities of SPARC BC is always a challenge. The organization strives to balance the work of its social enterprises against the scope and scale of core-funded activities, such as accessibility programs. Contract work commitments, staffing variations, and the leveraging of external funding opportunities over the course of the year can affect this balance, leaving opportunities for program adjustment and reinvestment from year to year. We had a very successful year in acquiring support funding for core projects. We did not anticipate the significant rise in parking permit sales. Reinvestment of our enterprise incomes will continue and we have planned a number of ambitious corefunded activities in the coming year.

SPARC BC continues to maintain a reserve fund for adequately supporting our cash flow needs as well as its capacity to provide some stability for the organization in the event of an interruption in funding. We remain committed to prudent financial management of the organization to ensure that it can continue to deliver on its social mandate over the long term.

As the organization grows, physical capacity has become a significant concern. We have been actively searching for a larger office space that meets our needs. The Board of Directors has segregated funds within the reserve to cover the costs required to find, prepare, and move to a new office.

We are very pleased to mark the occasion of Michael Goldberg's retirement from 19 years with SPARC BC as our highly regarded social researcher and advocate, by using reserve funds to establish an investment with the Vancity Community Foundation. The income from SPARC BC's Michael Goldberg Legacy Fund will be directed by the Board each year into advocacy or research projects that respect Michael's many contributions.

Over the past two years as Treasurer of SPARC BC, the organization has shown promising growth and financial strength. Finally, I would like to thank to all SPARC BC members and donors for your generous support of the organization's research, programs, and services.

# CHANGE OF NAME

On July 6, 2005, the Society changed its name to SPARC BC Society from SPARC Association of BC., as so known as the Social Planning and Research Council of B.C., SPARC BC Society is a provincially incorporated non-profit Society and a federally registered charitable organization. Its mission is to war with communities in building a just and healthly society for all persons in BC.

# SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES 7

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles, including those discussed below.

# Use of estimates

In conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles, management is required to make estimates and assumptions that could affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of confingant assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures during the year. Actual results could differ from those reported.

# Property and equipment

Property and equipment is recorded at cost. Equipment is amortized on the straight-line method over three years. Leaseholds are amortized on the straight-line method over the ferm of the lease.

# Unearned revenues and unexpended project funds

Project funding and other revenues received in advance are recognized as operating revenues when the related expenditure is incurred.

Unearned revenue represents direct access gaming funds designated for expenditures in 2006/2007.

# Deferred lease inducement

The deferred lease inducement is being amortized over seven years, the term of the related lease.

SPARC BC'S AGM is being held in Surrey for the first time. The Board of Directors of SPARC BC supports the social development activity burgeoning in Surrey and wants to demonstrate its commitment to working with communities throughout the province in building a just and healthy society for all.

Norma Strachan called the meeting to order and welcomed everyone to the meeting.

Agenda packages were distributed and introductions were made around the room.

# **MINUTES**

Minutes from the June 2004 Annual General Meeting were distributed.

Moved by Liz Robertson, seconded by Sheila Dobie, that the June 2004 Annual General Meeting Minutes be adopted. CARRIED.

## PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The President's written report is contained in the package. Daniel Hill noted that it has been a busy active year. The Board is pleased with the 3 areas of focus; income security, accessibility and community development, and on the progress towards strategic goals and objectives. The strategic and operational planning cycle are effectively producing appropriately targeted actions.

The Board is particularly proud of the increase in the scope and effectiveness of SPARC BC's work on issues of community accessibility. A highlight is the successful Dialogue on Accessibility; this was a unique event and it has generated much interest. Access Awareness Day activities happening tomorrow will include bus and radio advertisements. SPARC BC has issued 86,000 parking permits across BC.

We are proud to present needed community development education in northern and rural areas in BC. We're also very pleased with the improved layout and theme contents for SPARC BC News.

Congratulations to all the staff at SPARC BC and to my fellow Board members for the work that supports this robust and complex organization.

### TREASURER'S REPORT

The written report of the Treasurer is contained in the package. Derek Gent, Treasurer, presented the audited financial statements for the fiscal year 2004/2005. Derek reported that SPARC BC had a very good year financially. The SPARC BC research department is being discovered by the community and the revenue of this enterprising element of the organization has doubled from the previous year.

The organization has done a lot of work in planning for its future; this reflection has resulted in a strong year, good performances and success even in light of the economic climate for the not-for-profit sector. Our success in social enterprise, our managed growth and the Board's stewardship has increased our capacity to promote social change.

Derek reported that the auditors where very complementary regarding the work of Ken Kaneda, SPARC BC's Manager of Finance and Administration. The exceptional record keeping made their job easy and demonstrates the wisdom of the investment's Ken has made in information technology.

## **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT**

Nancy Henderson, ED of SPARC BC says that she always plans her report as a look to the future. There is much planned for the coming year, not only building on some of the projects from the last two years, but also laying groundwork for events coming up. One task in the coming year will be to do some development in government relations in preparation for our release of the new advocacy report on income assistance.

With the upcoming municipal election, SPARC BC will be doing our usual "Vote" work and engagement on public education and participation of the issues. The World Urban Forum coming in June 2006 leaves us with time to prepare.

Jim Sands reported on the upcoming Community Social Planning Network Conference (CSPNC) on June 17 & 18, 2005. There are about 60 registrants, the conference hopes to create a network and nurture continued communication among the delegates. It also aims to increase the profile of social planning as an issue for the upcoming municipal elections.

Moved by Suzy Blown, and seconded by Aleem Bharmal, that the Executive Director's report be accepted. CARRIED.

# NOMINATIONS REPORT

Liz Robertson, Chair of the Nominating Committee referred to the report from the Nominating Committee in the package. She noted that with the nominees the Board of Directors will total 14 members and that this is the best well-rounded provincial rep-

resentation on the board. The Committee recommends that the AGM vote that these members be elected to the Board of SPARC BC.

Moved by Norma Strachan, and seconded by Aleem Bharmal, that the current directors, Sheila Dobie, Daniel Hill, Mike Popoff, Liz Robertson and Derek Gent, whose terms are expiring to be re-elected to another 2 year term to June 2007 and that Lynn Florey, Jean Bennet, Denise Taylor and Glenda Watson Hyatt be elected to serve for a two year term to 2007. CARRIED.

Liz noted that Peter Chau, Stephen Hutchinson, Aleem Bharmal, Suzy Blown and Norma Strachan are continuing their two year terms to June 2006.

# SPECIAL RESOLUTION FOR OFFICIAL CHANGE OF NAME

Aleem Bharmal explained this AGM vote is to implement a change of name for ourselves, our third in our 39 year history. The organization was first incorporated as the Voluntary Association for Health and Welfare, and then changed its name in 1971 to SPARC Association of BC. SPARC once stood for "Social Planning and Review Council" and more recently as "Social Planning and Research". Lots of people know us just as "SPARC", but with the implementation of our new logo identify for our 35th anniversary, the Board wanted to make sure to emphasize our operation as a provincial organization. We've been using SPARC BC for almost five years, and in preparation for our 40th anniversary in 2006, the Board of Directors has decided to recommend that the name change become official.

A Special Resolution is required for this change, and it must pass with a 75% majority of votes.

Moved by Derek Gent, and seconded by Sheila Dobie, that the Special Resolution of the Society pursuant to Section 20 of the Society Act of BC that the name is hereby changed to SPARC BC Society be accepted. All attended voted in favour, no objections. CARRIED.

## GENERAL BUSINESS OF THE SOCIETY

On behalf of the whole Board, Sheila Dobie thanked the 2 departed Board members.

Joanne Schroeder, was with us for a very brief time. Her new job and family situation just had more demands than she'd anticipated therefore is was necessary for her to resign from the Board.

Paul Cabaj was a Board member from 2001, but had been offered an opportunity to moved with his family to Uruguay. We've since heard that he's settled and is working on a community economic development project. Paul had much direct experience and academic background with cooperatives and other ced tools and we appreciated his perspective and humour on the Board.

We are also saying goodbye to another Board member tonight: Roberta Hamilton has been a member of the Board since 1998. She has represented three regions of the province during her tenure with SPARC BC; first Fort ST. John, then Prince George, and finally Castlegar. What has been most impressive is the effort she has taken to engage with the local community and connect them with the work of SPARC BC in each place. She has shared her knowledge and experience of organizations and governance issues as well as her experience in public health and the direct awareness of social issues that brings. Roberta earned a Masters Degree from Royal Roads University in her time at SPARC BC. Roberta was presented with a windchime for her garden in Castlegar to thank her for all her work with SPARC BC, helping to blow the winds of change.

Celebrating Community Development in Surrey, Suzy Blown and Lynn Florey presented the "Thumbs Up" volunteer recognition awards to individuals and organizations that are here tonight for the work they are doing for community development in Surrey.

• Phoenix Drug and Alcohol Recovery and Education Society: Michael Wilson said his organization tries to create a learning community which adapts to changing circumstances as necessary and has been successful in achieving the Vancity Award to build new premises. They have found that their work has enriched the culture and has brought people together.

- Progressive Intercultural Community Services
   Society: Charan Gill informed the audience
   that the organization started by assisting farm
   workers but has grown to serve the needs of the
   growing and changing community. They have
   just expanded their senior housing facilities.
   Today ELSA and ESL courses are a large part
   the programming that they offer in addition to
   translation services to the diverse community.
- Surrey Quality of Life: Randall Mackinnon expressed he felt he'd come home and related a story that his early exposure to SPARC BC had made an impact on his career decision to study Social Planning at UBC. He has worked in social planning in Calgary and has now returned to Surrey to bring a positive spin to the topic and its issues. The organization is building positive awareness to the issues with its conversations with stakeholders this is assisted by the organization becoming a member of the Surrey Chamber of Commerce.
- Surrey Abilities Society: Patricia Cecchetto had given up her job to volunteer her assistance to those with a brain injury seeking the services they required. No services for people with brain injuries were available in Surrey at the time and now, the organization has come a long way from its first client and its first support group meeting at the Surrey Recreation Centre next door. The organization has now grown significantly to 4 facilitators and support workers.

Make Poverty History wristbands were distributed to the audience. Michael Goldberg provided background for the campaign. Matthew Beall showed the audience a video clip from the promotional campaign.

Liz thanked everyone for coming and sharing their Friday evening with us and reminded everyone of the very special event for next AGM to celebrate our 40th Anniversary.

The meeting was adjourned to continue the celebration of social planning work over refreshments.
