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## President's Report

At last year's Annual General Meeting, we made great efforts to celebrate and reflect on forty incredible years of delivering results and serving communities through SPARC BC. In our 41<sup>st</sup> year, and my first year as President, I can't help but think that we are increasingly focused forward into the future. It is an exciting time to be involved with this organization, as we continue to strengthen our financial position, achieve greater impacts and serve more and more requests to leverage our expertise around key areas of income security, community development, and accessibility.

Perhaps the most exciting aspect of SPARC BC's work is the extent to which we are taking on initiatives that serve multiple priorities and express a more holistic vision of how we support 'a just and healthy society for all.' Accessibility issues are social justice issues. They connect to income security issues and are often best addressed through an inclusive process of community development and evidence-based research. When we track our core work and research and consulting projects, we pay ever closer attention to how different issues interconnect and how we can further our mandate. In the process, we better serve our clients and stakeholders on multiple levels and are more effective in our work.

Our Parking Permit Program for People with Disabilities serves more than 94,000 people across the province. We are embracing our role a promoter of broad issues of accessibility through our networks in community, and via high profile events like our World Urban Forum workshop on accessible urban space.

Our Community Development Education Program continues to be well received and has grown to provide program service in fifteen communities across the province. We are also looking at how we can improve the program with better support for collaboration between aboriginal and non-aboriginal populations.

Our staff also continues to produce important leading edge research, such as a project funded by Canadian Council of Learning that looks at the way aboriginal culture is communicated within schools in the Lillooet area, and a critical examination

of the social development planning processes underway in a number of municipalities in the province.

It is clear that we have absolutely top-notch staff in the organization and we are extremely proud. We would also like to recognize the efforts of our many volunteers and partners, as well as our funders and clients, without whom we could not do this work.

## Executive Director's Statement

Annual reports are mostly about looking back, but as the Executive Director of a vibrant, active organization, I need to always be looking ahead. We have another exciting year planned at SPARC BC. As we've doubled in size over the last few years, we have had to develop new ways of working in order to meet the challenges of growth. This year, our challenge will be to find appropriate, accessible, and adaptable space for all our activities.

Our emphasis in our core work will continue to be around community development issues. Not only will we continue to expand the Community Development Education program with our collaborative partners from the Learning Initiatives for Rural and Northern BC, we will develop a series of publications as part of a Community Learning Library to further knowledge transfer that supports community work. The initial publications will include books that look at the development of a social plan, organizing a local homelessness count, and assessing the cost of living within community.

We are also working on the organization's other priority areas of focus: accessibility and income security. In accessibility, we will work on a study of municipal supports to accessibility, looking at both policy and bylaw support. We will use the review to develop recommendations around local governments' best practices for legislative support for accessibility. In the area of income security, we will continue to support Campaign 2000 in its reporting on child poverty within the province and across the country.

We expect to see a federal election within our planning year, so have already begun to work on our Canada Chooses papers. We plan to collaborate with colleagues from other social planning councils in Alberta, Manitoba, Ontario, and New Brunswick to bring a national perspective to the social issues we feature in the papers. We will distribute the Votes papers and encourage voter engagement on social issues across the country.

The Social Planning and Research Council of BC could not be the vibrant and active organization it is without its talented and committed staff. Many thanks to all the staff and volunteers, and especially to the Board of Directors for another year of exceptional leadership.

## Treasurer's Report

In my first year as Treasurer of SPARC BC, I am pleased to announce another strong financial year for the organization, with a recorded surplus of \$105,826.

SPARC BC had strong revenue this fiscal year, with total revenues 5% above budget forecasts. Thanks to the hard work of SPARC staff, contracted research exceeded budgeted expectations by 10%. Donations and parking permits were 14% and 5% above budget, respectively. Membership fell 2% short of the budgeted target.

Despite some expenses exceeding their budget amounts, due in large part to staff growth, total expenditures remained 2% below budget. After a long negotiation, a new collective agreement was ratified in March. This contract provides the organization with some stability in terms of staff salary and advancement for the next four years.

With the organization desperately outgrowing its current office and the lease expiring in 2008, this is the year to locate and renovate a new home for SPARC BC.

Overall, the organization has shown growth and financial strength, which should continue for the foreseeable future. Thanks to all SPARC BC staff, members, and donors for another great year in building a just and healthy society for all!

# FOR THE YEAR ENDED MARCH 31, 2007

## PURPOSE OF SOCIETY

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SPARC BC Society is a provincially incorporated non-profit society and a federally registered charitable organization. Its mission is to work with communities in building a just and healthy society for all persons in British Columbia.

# SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES 7

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles, including those discussed below.

## Use of estimates

In conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles, management is required to make estimates and assumptions that could affect the reported amounts of assets and itabilities and disclosure of contringent assets and itabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures during the year. Actual results could differ from those reported.

## Revenue recognition

Permit sales, memberships and donations are recognized on cash basis when received.

United Way and other grants are recognized on cash basis when the grants were received.

Direct access gaming funds are recognized when the approved programs have commenced.

Consulting services are recognized on the basis of research project agreements.

## Property and equipment

Property and equipment is recorded at cost. Computers and other equipment are amortized on the straight-line method over three years. Leaseholds are amortized on the straight-line method over the term of the lease.

# Unearned revenues and unexpended project funds

Project funding and other revenues received in advance are recognized as operating revenues when the related expenditure is incurred.

Unearned revenue represents direct access gaming funds designated for expenditures for the 2008 fiscal

# Deferred lease inducement

The deferred lease inducement is being amortized over seven years, the term of the related lease.

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## Minutes of the 2005/06 Annual General Meeting

Founding member Deryck Thomson was celebrated, as was original member Patricia Fulton. Life members and Deryck Thomson award winners were also recognized, and two new life members named: Michael and Dianne Goldberg. As the celebration was also in honour of Michael Goldberg's retirement, the Board of Directors were pleased to announce the creation of the Michael Goldberg Legacy Fund for SPARC BC. This fund will be held at the Vancity Community Foundation and will be directed by SPARC BC's Board each year into advocacy or research projects that respect Michael's many contributions.

Nancy Henderson called the meeting to order and welcomed everyone to the meeting.

### **President's Report**

The President's written report, contained in the package, was referenced. Daniel Hill noted that he steps down from this position at this meeting, but thanked everyone for the opportunity to serve with such a remarkable organization. He offered congratulations to all the staff at SPARC BC and to fellow Board members on this special anniversary and thanks for their work in continuing to support it.

Moved by Daniel Hill, seconded by Sheila Dobie, that the President's report be adopted. CARRIED.

### **Treasurer's Report**

The written report of the Treasurer, contained in the package, was referenced. Derek Gent, Treasurer, presented the audited financial statements for the fiscal year 2005/06. Derek noted that strong funding, donations and social enterprise revenues mark 2005/06. He also reviewed the creation of the Michael Goldberg Legacy Fund and thanked all the supporters for their generosity.

Moved by Derek Gent, and seconded by Glenda Watson Hyatt, that the Treasurer's report be accepted. CARRIED.

Moved by Derek Gent, and seconded by Daniel Hill, that the Audited Financial Statements of 2005/06 be adopted. CARRIED.

Moved by Derek Gent and seconded by Liz Robertson, that Loewen Stronach is appointed as SPARC BC's auditors for 2006/07 Fiscal year. CARRIED.

#### **Executive Director's Report**

Nancy Henderson, ED of SPARC BC spoke to some of the current work of the organization. She described some of the activities around Access Awareness Day, and particularly the planned work for the World Urban Forum promoting Accessible Urban Space. The Community Development Education program is working collaboratively with other organizations providing education to ensure that communities are receiving the best possible programs tailored to their needs. Our last report on the growing gap between cost of living and income assistance, issued in December 2005, was again welcomed by advocates for its data and analysis, but unfortunately had to be called "Left Behind", to indicate the unsustainable gulf between income assistance rates in the province and what is needed to support an included life in community.

There are many interesting research projects, and SPARC BC is pleased to be working even more often with local governments around the province. She particularly thanked the staff, present and past, for making the organization the credible, respected one it is. She also thanked the Board, as important volunteers for the organization, and for providing leadership and direction to maintain the successes that SPARC BC enjoys.

Moved by Aleem Bharmal, and seconded by Liz Robertson, that the Executive Director's report be accepted. CARRIED.

### **Nominations Report**

Liz Robertson, Chair of the Nominating Committee referred to the report from the Nominating Committee in the package. She noted that with the nominees the Board of Directors will total 13 members and that this well-rounded provincial representation on the board has again been maintained. The Committee recommends that the AGM vote that these members be elected to the Board of SPARC BC.

Moved by Liz Robertson, and seconded by Sheila Dobie, that the current directors, Peter Chau, Stephen Hutchinson, and Aleem Bharmal, whose terms are

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expiring to be re-elected to another two-year term to June 2008, and that Hal Gerein, Marcie Fofonoff, and Irene Willsie, be elected to serve two-year terms to 2008. CARRIED.

Liz noted that Jean Bennet, Sheila Dobie, Lynn Florey, Derek Gent, Daniel Hill, Mike Popoff, Denise Taylor, and Glenda Watson Hyatt, are continuing their two-year terms to June 2007.

The Board recognized and thanked Daniel Hill, for his service as President of the organization since 2003. The Board also thanked retiring Board members Liz Robertson, Suzanne Blown, and Norma Strachan for their service in the governance of SPARC BC.
