Between 2009 - 2012, the number of seniors and persons with disabilities (PWD) on BC Housing's social housing waitlist increased from 1,575 to **2,172** people.



In 2011, **15,190** seniors lived on a low income. Seniors living alone had after-tax incomes of approximately \$19,500 or less. Seniors living in couples had after-tax incomes of approximately \$27,250 or less.

Health Concerns




In 2011, the Vancouver Health Service Delivery Area found that **26%** of seniors had perceived their health as fair to poor.




Between 2000 - 2010, 3,345 new immigrant seniors settled in Vancouver.
